WORLDCAT DISCOVERY FINDS RESOURCES AT OTHER LIBRARIES FAR AND NEAR

You may have noticed something new when you search with *WorldCat Discovery* from the Library's homepage. Not only does it show results for Conant Library (books, e-books, and articles), but also for libraries regionally and beyond as well! In fact, it's not unusual to see a title that is 'Held by: Worcester ARC Libraries'. ARC is an acronym for the *Academic and Research Collaborative*, a coalition that includes the Worcester Public Library

and most of the Worcester-area college libraries. If you find and want something that is held by one of these libraries you can make an interlibrary loan request online right within *WorldCat* by clicking the title of the item and then the 'Request Item from Other Libraries'

button. If it's a book you can't wait a couple of days for and you have a car we can give you a **cross-borrowing ARC card** that permits Nichols students, faculty, and staff to **walk in and borrow books directly** from many of these institutions. 'MY LIBRARY ACCOUNT' FEATURES



Ever wonder what the 'My Library Account' is about? It shows you when your checked-out items are due, lets you renew your books (assuming they are not overdue), shows you fines/fees for lost items, and enables you to place a 'hold/reserve' on books or DVDs that are currently checked out by someone else to receive a notice when they have been returned. You can also save your *WorldCat Discovery* searches for future use. A link is also available on the results pages.

By the way, we take the privacy of your personal information quite seriously. LIBRARY ASSESSMENT

During fall semester the Library underwent a peer review of our operations, services and resources by Ms. Vivienne Piroli, Library Director at Simmons University Library. She identified and made some suggestions for areas of improvement but, overall, was rather complimentary. She noted, for example, that the library was a very welcoming space, well utilized by students, and commended the staff on its efforts to support student learning, campus engagement, and social responsibility. We've already implemented some of her suggestions, including the addition of an **A** – **Z Database list** and **database video tutorials** on the Database page. More to follow!

OERS (OPEN EDUCATION RESOURCE)



Every semester the Library spends funds the purchase or rental of textbooks which students can borrow. We're happy to do this as it helps make Nichols a bit more affordable for students. We know this service is definitely being used as textbooks on reserve circulate between 4-5,000 times each year! Ideally, textbooks and other course-related materials would be free or, at least, much more affordable. To make this a reality, a growing number of institutions and their libraries across the county are encouraging the adoption of more OER-based resources by their faculty, not only to help reduce costs for students, but also to enhance the

quality of classroom teaching and learning. Some of our faculty are already exploring and utilizing OERs, but with support from the Academic Affairs office, Nichols is more actively joining this movement and the Library is pleased to do what it can to support it by offering information and resources.

To that end, we offer a brief primer on OER below. The Library has also created a webpage devoted to OER that can be accessed by clicking on the 'OER' link on the left side of the Library's homepage or directly at: https://my.nichols.edu/academics/conantlibrary/Pages/OER.aspx. Here you can learn about OER and find a list of recommended sources with links to the major repositories of quality OER textbooks and more.

On April 2, the Faculty Teaching Center is hosting Matt Bejune, Executive Director of the Library at Worcester State University, to share his campus' experience with their OER initiative.

What are Open Educational Resources?

A major and early promoter of OER was the Hewlett Foundation. Here's their oft-shared definition of OER: "Open Educational Resources are teaching, learning, and research materials in any medium – digital or otherwise – that reside in the public domain or have been released under an open license that permits no-cost access, use, adaptation and redistribution by others with no or limited restrictions."

Open educational resources can include full courses, course materials, modules, textbooks, data sets, streaming media, recorded lectures, video tutorials, tests and quizzes, software, and other tools, resources, materials, or techniques used to support access to and sharing of knowledge.
