

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM — BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

Nichols offers to the academically-minded high school or preparatory school graduate an opportunity to equip himself for eventual entrance into the professional business world. The academic program which is available to students at Nichols College of Business Administration includes accepted and traditional courses in collegiate business administration. Paralleling development in professional areas, the Nichols program, through electives and additional required courses, also recognizes the importance of the development of the individual and prepares him to participate in and contribute to a strongly individualistic business society. A unique feature of the program, designed to correlate all factors of a Nichols education (course instruction, summer field experience program and Advisory Council activity), includes the writing of a thesis and a three-hour, two-semester Business Clinic Seminar.

The program required for qualification for the degree of Bachelor of Business Administration contains the following major areas of study:

> Accounting Finance Management Marketing

Forest Management Park Management Wildlife Management

When the Nichols man graduates from the college after four years, he will have spent at least thirty semester hours or approximately one year specializing in his major area of study. A selection of this major area will have been based on aptitude, performance and interest as shown during his Freshman and Sophomore years at the college.

Interspersed between professional courses will be required subjects designed both for transitional purposes and for the purpose of selfdevelopment.



DORMITORIES


Over eighty percent of the students reside in college campus dormitories. For the great majority, therefore, this means acceptance of the responsibilities and freedoms that living in a college community requires. The college recognizes the need for guidance and leadership in assisting students to adjust to community living and provides this through resident faculty counselors and upper-class student proctors. The upperclassmen in each dormitory are especially helpful in assisting freshmen make the adjustment to college life.

Each dormitory is a small independent living unit within the larger campus community. This permits individual identification with a social group. Students learn to respect the rights and property of their classmates. The give and take of dormitory living teaches students to work and live cooperatively.

Most rooms are double, although there are some single rooms in several of the dormitories. Each dormitory contains a lounge and a recreation room with a television set. The lounges are favorite meeting places for the students who wish to discuss personal and academic problems. Frequently the faculty counselor, at the request of the students, enters into these discussions to impart his wisdom and guidance.





Nichols sponsors teams in six different sports in the spring. The college is fortunate in having available a nine-hole golf course.




